Indigenous Culture and Collaboration



OPENING KEYNOTE PRESENTATION Innovation and Technology: A survival guide

Megan Richardson, Director, Virtual Museum of Canada

If keeping pace with accelerating innovation and technology were really the goal, as the conference title suggests, the Canadian museum community would be in trouble. Rather, the goal should be knowing whether a technological solution will help you meet your goals, what's possible technologically, who's doing great work, and whether – and how – it's transferable to your situation. From her unique perspective as the leader of a digital investment program for Canadian museums, and with a museum education career spanning the decades since the rise of the Internet, Megan will examine what we mean by innovation and technology and its importance for the GLAM sector. She will share some inspiring examples of technology can never be a substitute for the real thing, used with imagination and creativity it can enhance the experience of it, and open up new forms of access and avenues of interpretation.

Megan Richardson has spent her career creating and supporting connections among people and museum collections. After establishing the education program at the Canadian Museum of Contemporary Photography, Megan moved to the National Gallery of Canada where she was a manager, and then head, of education. She introduced the Gallery's first collection app, a national online teen art contest, and the distance learning program. She also revitalized the flagship family program; and oversaw onsite and online interpretation for major international temporary exhibitions.

Megan is currently the Director of the Virtual Museum of Canada, a national digital cultural investment program, managed by the Canadian Museum of History. She is responsible for the annual calls for proposals, dozens of projects in development, and the program websites. Megan is leading the VMC renewal, an intensive 3-step process to better meet the needs of Canadian museums and heritage organizations.

Innovative Curatorship and Indigenous Collaboration: A best practice case study 1/3 North Room

Learning from each other through storytelling creates empathy, understanding, commonality and community. Innovation in the Repatriation of Ancestral Remains Columbia Room *Located on the 2nd floor*



Lucy Bell, Head of the First Nations Department and Repatriation Program, Royal BC Museum and BC Archives; Genevieve Hill, Archaeology Collections Manager, Royal BC Museum and BC Archives; Lia Tarle, PhD Candidate, Simon Fraser University

This session explores the ethics of holding ancestral remains and the process of repatriation. Under the guidance of Lucy Bell, who has many years of experience repatriating Haida ancestors, the RBCM's First Nations and Repatriation department has been establishing policy and procedures which are based on *yaghudang*, respect for the ancestral remains and belongings currently in our care. Practical tips about the RBCM's assessment of our current holdings and the development of procedures will be discussed. Some ethical challenges to the display of uncontested ancestral remains, and innovate ways that these remains have been displayed will also be discussed.

Writing Winning YCW Proposals

I have written top-scoring, fully-funded proposals for Young Canada Works summer student funding every year for the past twenty years. If you have had less success than you would like with this program, bring your recent proposal to Conference – in your twenty-minute session, I will review it, give you advice on exactly what the program is looking for in a proposal, and offer specific suggestions for strengthening your request. You will leave the session with concrete, practical ideas for strengthening your applications to this program.

Innovation: Who decides what it is?

Is the word 'innovative' a comfortable fit for your organization? Do you wonder if what your Museum is doing is innovative enough to be described as such? The presenter will use a real example from the Britannia Mine Museum to spark conversation. This session is geared for mid-sized organizations. Participants will take away ideas for framing innovation in their organizations as a value that is achievable even if budgets are small and projects routine. Best practice, good practice, and the real-world practice of digitization of audio, video and film for preservation and access. Ember is happy to talk frankly about the risks and rewards of digitizing collections including what worked and what didn't. She will also be happy to provide links to resources she has found helpful.

BC Heritage Emergency Response Network

B.C. conservators are working with the BCMA to develop an emergency response and collections salvage network to support cultural, heritage and arts institutions throughout the Province. Knowing your risks, training to respond and creating connections will ensure prompt action from local teams with local resources. Come learn about the BCHERN and help us build a network to best serve you.

Refine Your Collection: How to Plan Deaccessioning and Collection Clean-Up Projects Luc Desmarais, Freelance Contractor

Refining your collection can be a daunting task. Where do you begin? In this Ask the Expert roundtable, Luc will guide you through the collection clean-up and deaccessioning process. Using policy samples, practical experience, and an examination of ethical roadblocks, the path to a refined collection will be outlined in this session, with emphasis on discussing your own situation. Lightning Talk – The Potluck Project

Our sector benefits greatly from a wide variety of experience, disciplines and perspectives. This is especially true in small institutions where daily tasks of staff or volunteers seem to include everything one can imagine: bookkeeper, exhibit designer, grant writer, office administrator, human resources, handyman, janitor, public relations liaison, social media/marketing guru...the list goes on. Small institutions are often in the position of being unable to train staff or volunteers; so I have been developing a website that is essentially a freely accessible collection of resources specific to small institutions to help share our collective knowledge and experience. I expect attendees to learn about the challenges and strategies employed by small institutions to achieve their goals, and to learn how they can benefit from the shared experiences of other similarly-structured museums, art galleries, cultural centers, and archives that the Potluck Project can provide. Attendees will learn about this project and how they can contribute to its growth and development, and subsequently utilize the resources shared by others. As all of the content in this resource is generated by small institutions, participation is key in getting it off the ground.

Accelerating Together: Strategies for promoting heritage and historical consciousness Joe Borsato, Museum Coordinator, Museum of the Cariboo Chilcotin

Using exhibitions from the Museum of the Cariboo Chilcotin in Williams Lake BC as case studies, this presentation discusses how small, mostly rural, community museums can sufficiently represent their constituents to visitors. In particular, museum workers need to demonstrate an attentiveness to the myth of the frontier, a pervasive narrative that distorts the origin stories of communities at the expense typically of marginalized groups. Overall, museums must work with constituent organizations and other heritage groups to represent competing narratives and help overcome the myth of the frontier, thereby providing a more historical and honest representation of the community.
